Wouldn't the whole nation have rung with publicity about the character of Socialists as being co-habiters with fallen women and even low enough to steal from them? Sure. But when it is one of the men whom the republicans have had at Washington making laws for the benefit of the trusts and monopolies, it is different, don't you know!

The cities must be industrial hells, if half what the papers say be true. The contractors say they are terrorized by the unions and the unions are terrorized by the contractors. One law suit following another grows out of the strained relations of the slaves to the masters, and strike after strike has caused inconvenience and heavy loss to both sides. This all grows out of the fact that the contractors and masters refuse to recognize the rights of the men and women who produce their wealth. IT IS TO THE INTEREST OF THE WORK-ERS TO GET THE HIGHEST PAY FOR THE SHORT-EST HOURS AND ON THE OTHER HAND IT IS THE INTEREST OF THE MASTERS TO GET THE LONG-EST HOURS FOR THE LOWEST PAY. This condition is the one that makes all the trouble and will continue to make an increasing amount of trouble until the social structure tumbles down in chaos. It can be remedied by no possible means under this system unless human nature can be changed-which is impossible. Do you think that this increasing trouble between the masters and the workers and the public can go on forever? Do you not know that the conditions are getting continuously worse, no matter whether wages are increased or not? Are you so blind that you will refuse to study the fundamental causes and change CONDITIONS and thus possibly avert a revolution? If this strife keeps up a few more years without any ohenge in the laws giving labor added benefits and a VOICE IN THE MANAGEMENT OF THE INDUS-TRIES, you are running great risks of a social upheaval that will make you think. You need not hug the delusion that it is a matter that does not and will not concern you-for it does. You know that many in the north and many in the south took no part in the slavery agitation, as being little or nothing to them-but in the wind up they, too, were drawn into it. FORCE will not remedy the conditions. It will require REASON. And no matter what is done it will have to be done over again unless what is done is RIGHT. Maybe not what you consider right today, but what you consider right after having gone through the pain. Socialism offers a remedy that will make strikes impossible. You say the remedy is too radical—the making of all property common heritage of the race. Yes, it is radical, but unless you belp apply it you will find that these strikes will grow into something MORE radical, and after the storm shall have blown over you will then have to apply the Socialist program to prevent its repetition. Selfshness."

It is claimed for the competitive system that it develops strong individuals, that in the struggle and tussle for mental and physical mastery, character is moulded, and the strongest and best comes to the surface. In this there is a half truth. Our Morgans, Carnegies and Rockefellers, control the industrial situation today largely because of mental mastery, gained by long training in industrial conflict. Dickens tells a story of a man who digged a bole in his garden, and fell through to a strange and won ful land where the people had evolved to the point where their dominant faculties had become individualized. Some people were all eyes, some all ears, others had been individualized to stomachs, still others to arms, legs, and so on through the range of physical and mental powers and faculties.

Our industrial giants have become individualized financial minds. All their mental powers focus on the matter of money making. This would work the world no injury, were it not for the fact that money making is purely a matter of traffic in human labor. We could afford to admire these men as colossal structures of genius, but for the fact that in this so-called genius is wrapped up the sontrol of our own food, clothing, and shelter.. In other words a millionaire is only the product of what millions of hard-worked hands have produced. Most of us wish to be something else than an individualized financial head, or a workingman's hand. Some of us would like to paint the world's beauties, garner the voices of nature into songs and symphonies, touch the chords of of the human heart, and fathom the depths of the soul. Not all of us can find life's joys in the mart, and the stock exchange, nor are we content alone to be hewers of wood and drawers of water. Our fives are cursed by things for which we do not care, and deeds that burden us. In the midst of our dreams we are aroused to create profits for capitalism. The lash of necessity drives us to the field or factory, not alone to satisfy our needs, but that Rockefeller may have 12 cents profit on each gallon of oil that he sells, and that Morgan may declare a dividend of \$50,000,000. The heart of the woman that longs for love is crushed 'neath the Juggernaut' wheels of commerce, and the joyous energy of the child is forged into profits for the lords of the market. Rev. Father T. Lillis, pastor of St. Patrick's church and acting coadiutor bishop of the Kansas City diocese, says "That the man who takes the cath of the International Typographical Union denies himself the right to the sacraments of the Catholic church." The part of the oath to which the Catholic effective means of accomplishing that end. church objects is as follows: "My fidelity to the union, and my duty to the members thereof shall in no sense be interefered with by any allegiance that I may now or hereafter owe to any other organization, social, political or religious, secret or otherwise." The reverend gentleman further said:

"The Catholic presenting himself for absolution, having taken that oath, has already denied to himself the right to the sacraments of that church. He has promised under oath not to allow any intereference with his union, even though the principles of his union might be opposed to the principles of the church. In other words, he has placed his union above his religion, and this the Catholic church does not permit. Unless the printers' union expunges that part of the oath, no good Catholic can be a member of it

An officer of the International Typographical union was shown the foregoing interview with the Rev. Father Lillis. He said:

I cannot speak with authority upon this matter, neither can any other member of the union, because it is a matter for the consideration of the offi-cers of the international union. Therefore you must not use my name. But I will say that this oath is not likely to be changed because it is right. This oath was formulated some fifteen years ago to combat certain sociteies that prung up within the international union, some of them claiming to religious societies. These subsidiary societies were doing irregular things and we had to have an eath that put the international union above all else. It is right that the union should be ahead of any other organization, religiously. otherwise. Suppose we had no such oath and I, a member of a certain church, had charge of a big printing office. I could give work only to mem-bers of my church, or of my political organization. Such things have been done. As it is now I dare not discriminate against any workman because of do charges can be preferred his religious, political or social views. If I against me and I can be expelled from the union."

The Internation Typographical Union is a purely economic organization, having but one thought, that of the economic betterment of its members. It grands neither for nor against any religious organization. It is simply fighting a great battle on the economic field for the good of its members in the show your power at the policy organize for possession of the powers of government in food, clothing and shelter battle. Its oath was to shut off the possibility of faveritism through religious or social organization, and make one man's card as good as another, other things being equal in point of the ability of the holder to do the kind of work best that might be in question. Its aim is to be thoroughly democratic in its administration, and it was one of the first stance for you and a fat living for the men unions to give to women proper recognition, paying to them the same wages for the same work as that paid to men.

In our large industrial centers the membership of the typographical union is quite largely made up of men who are affiliated in some manner with out completely.

A printer in our large cities not a member of the union is compelled to take the lowest wages and the meanest conditions in the printing business. Today all this is changed and a no more self-respecting set of men can be found in all the land than the members of the International Typographical Union. They occupy the highest places in the society of the cities and hundreds of men, graduates from this union are now filling important political and commercial positions. To be a member of this union today is to be counted a man of letters. Formerly to find a man carrying the card of this organization was to uncover a miserable bum.

This union maintains for the benefit of its members a splendid home at Colorado Springs, Colo., where the man who is in good standing needs only the evidence of a paid-up card to find entrance thereto. He has helped to build this institution and he is part of it. He does not pauperize himself by an entry into its restful halls when old age and a lifetime of faithful service render him unfit to longer bear the heat and the burden of the day. Does the Catholic church offer its printer members a like home for their declining days? Then, too, this organization guarantees to each and every one of its members a decent burial when death shall come, and the widow, if any is left, is not obliged to accept charity. This money is hers, and her husband has helped placed it there. Surely such an institution has no mean virtues and it must be acepted that not a single thing within it is against any church or religious institution

The International Typographical Union may well be proud of its work in the uplifting of its membership and in teaching them to be men. This union sees something of its great mission and it has no quarrel only with the industrial forces that would keep its membership from enjoying to the full an abundance of food, clothing and shelter.

For the simple reason that the ownership of the soil on a large scale by the capitalist will add to his burdens of management, and little to his profits, Since his only motive in the ownership of capital is the absorption of profits, and since he is destroying competition for the purpose of making exploitation easier and less burdensome to him, the motive for the ownership of the soil in large units is lacking. The capitalist class will content itself with monopolizing the machinery of finishing and distributing the farmer's produc-

tion. Rockefeller does not seek to own the oil wells, but the refineries where oil is put in form for commercial use. He lets the individual produce the crude oil, and then takes it off his hands at a price fixed by the Standard Oil Company.

When the capitalist class have trustified the factories, mines, railroads, stores and banks, they will own all the machinery of production and distribution but the farms. The farmer will simply produce raw material which will have no value whatever until capitalism has taken it over the capitalist railroad, through the capitalist mill or slaughter house, and distributed it through the capitalist department store. The farmer will work himself and children long hours, face the weather, endure the drouth, and when his raw material is ready for the market the capitalist class will take so much of it as the case of the same business. These farmers are about as wise as the unloss who invite capitalist heachmen to make labor day addresses. The farmers worker, will never be remedied till they are selled by the class to which they both belong, and in the exact interest of the wealth producers. It is the custom in the castern countries to put a bell on lepers to owarn the people of their presence. If we could thus designate our capitalist politicians, and learn to know that they are all infected with the deadly virus of capitalist is me, we would avoid them as a pestilence. as they may wish, paying such price as may suit their purpose. The farmer can not strike, but must dig to the limit, and husband every straw and kernel of his production. With such control of the agricultural product, what possible reason would prompt the capitalist class to seek an ownership that would require more or less of personal supervision and worry? The farmer under the lash of necessity will do all the worrying, pay the taxes, and under the delusion of ownership protect "his" property to the utmost. This is a bad picture, is it not, brother farmer? Well, think a moment, and see if you are not doing this identical thing right now. You are so often told that you are the independent farmer, and you feel so proud of the fact that you own something, and your head has been so far in the clouds over the rise in the price of land that you don't know where you are "at." The capitalist class have already settled your status, with the possible exception of the wheat industry, but you have not discovered it, and even the Socialist with all his science is just finding it out.

It is just as important that we as Socialists correctly analyze this thing as that you understand it.

The Socialist economist and the Socialist party will, when these things are understood, know how to deal with the farmers. We will find that as a class you are as ripe for Socialism NOW as you will be for years to come We will know how to deal with the oil industry when our class gets possession of the government. The Standard Oil Co. has already built a system almost as perfect as that of the mail service. When we take over the government we will simply transfer the oil industry to the people without possibly changing a driver on the oil wagons, but no sane Socialist even dreams of thus transferring the farms. The whole matter of reorganizing agriculture will have to come up for solution after we have obtained poss the government. If it be true that the ownership of the soil, with the ownership of the machinery of finishing production and distribution in the hands of the capitalist, foes not constitute capital in the only sense in which a Socialist employs the term, then the farmer is economically ready for Socialism right now, which is the fundamental proposition in our position. If the farmer can get nothing in the way of relief from his exploitation till this capitalist class is removed from ownership of the essential means of production and distribution, then every immediate interest of the farmer joins him to the wage worker in the class struggle, AND FROM THE VERY NECESSITY OF THE CASE MAKES HIM A RADICAL WHO WILL NOT COMPROMISE WITH ANYTHING SHORT OF THE COMPLETE SURRENDER OF THE CAPITALIST CLASS.

It was no less a person than Leon Greenbaum, former secretary of the Socialist national committee, who pointed this out to the writer so late as January last, and who objected to taking the farmer into the Socialist party on the ground that the farmer would not stop to trifle with such insignificant demands as an eight-hour work day, factory inspector, etc., but would push the party on to the climax of the full Socialist program.

Comrade Greenbaum was right. The farmer Socialist is revolutionary, and it was precisely this thing that Comrade Untermann had in mind when he wrote his famous words concerning the farmer being a safer guardian of the party's interests than the city opportunist. However, it is one thing tor the foregoing to be true, and another to get this truth fixed in the minds of the agricultural class, but we hold that the task is no more difficult than that of winning the wage worker from the delusion of the full dinner pail and similar capitalistic rot. 


