

The object of collective ownership is, first, to prevent the taking of the laborer's product which private ownership of public necessities makes possible, and, second, to secure to each worker the full equivalent of what his labor socially produces. Whatever value the workers' labor produces is his private property; and it is the business. te property; and it is the business scialists to make him secure in this

Under the capitalist system the land lord takes part of the worker's product in the form of rent, the money shark takes part of it in the form of inter-set, and everybody with whom he has a dealing gets part of it in the form of profit. The fact that he makes more wealth than his wages will buy proves that he is exploited, or, in plainer language, robbed.

The object of Socialism is to put an and to this process of taking from the worker part of his private property which he has produced by his own effort. The collective ownership of land, machinery and tools are all to this purpose. Socialism is not to abolish private property, but to make private property possible to those who have the only right to it—the workers who produce it.


