Some Observations on Religion from The Standpoint of an Earnest Working Girl.

What we need is not the cast-off clothing, not the broken victuals of charity, but justice. And if every employer in Christianity gave him no higher sense of justice, no higher sense of duty to his fellow men, the shackles upon the limbs of Labor would remain unbroken, and, could we look beneeth the social structure, we would still see the bodies and souls of living men, even though in the palace above hung the picture of the lowly Christ.

To modify the capitalist system in order to save it, is the work of its friends. In theory, they defend the right of private property in the mines, factories, and transportation. Ilnes, which, from their nature, cannot be privately ereated or privately used property. But, in fact, they are attacking the fundamental rights of private property in these means of collective production; for they are restricting them in every possible way, so that the owners cannot do what they will with their own. They move toward Socialism because they must, inevitably, whether they will or not.

OUNDED as it is upon the violent suppression of the free land. capitalistic property is only able to persist by means of a series of what we have called connective institutions, which are noneconomic in character. These institutions are designed to discipline the egoism of the proprietary classes, and so vitiate the egoism of the laboring classes that they will be induced to put up with an oppressive eronomic system against which they would surely rebel if they were to follow the formal precepts laid down by their own interests. Morality, law and politics are the most important society, and send away wife and of these connective institutions. All three depend upon the economic children, to be joined to another environment and all proceed logically from the conditions which make is nothing more nor less than old for the persistence of capitalistic revenue. All thecontradictions and absurdities will disappear, however, with the advenof the coming social form. In the economy established upon equality and association social relations are self-adjustive and do not have to seek support in the perversion of the normal manifestations of human nature Under this pure economic system morality is simply the natural and spontaneous emanation of enlightened self-interest; the law reduces itself to a simple guarantee to the producer of the product of his own labor. and politics proceeds naturally from the general will. The capitalistic taint now pervading these institutions will, in other words, disappear entirely upon the cessation of capitalistic property, and leave the social spirit susceptible to the innumerable genial influences of which human nature is capable. Morality, law and politics will still remain the connective institutions of society, but, instead of being placed at the service of the economic interests of one particular class, they will benefit humanity as a whole and aid in developing its higher destinies; instead of forming the gluten of a tainted mass, these institutions will hold together a healthy body; instead of acting as cement to an aristocratic edifice, they will maintain the more perfectly proportioned structure of Human Equality.-Achille Loria.
