This sums up the result of last Tuesday's election. It is no surprise to the Socialists. In spite of the loud claims of the Bryan campaign managers and the noise of Bryan orators, no Socialist was deceived into believing that the democratic party could be resuscitated. The republican party is the political expression of dominant capitalism and it must continue in power until capitalism has played its little part in the world's affairs.

To the man who had given but superficial attention to political and industrial conditions in this country the election of Taft by such an overwhelming majority in the electoral college comes as a surprise. It would have seemed that the panie of 1907 and Taft's injunction record would have weaned thousands of voters from the republican standard, but the result shows that this was not the case. The result was anticipated by the Appeal and on numerous occasions, as our readers will remember, we pointed out that the republicans would win and that the democratic party would loose in many places where ordinarily it would have been victorious.

But the petitioners, so long as they remain in the receiver's employ, are very important in the operation of the road.
