He told me, "John, you will have to drop it," and told me he was an escaped German criminal under an assumed name and that he had to pay him a good round sum to quiet matters through the consul. For all I know this American consul is still doing business at the old stand.

Accompanied by Mr. Montgomery of San Francisco well known as Salvation Army philanthropist, I saw over 40 German subjects held in slavery by another American company in another

Army philanthropist, I saw over 40 German subjects held in slavery by another American company in another state. I narrowly escaped serious trouble trying to help them.

I know of one case, John Bird, son of Dr. Bird of Philadelphia, Pa., and brother of James Bird, some time marriage license clerk of Philadelphia, who was sold into slavery. I know of several cases of American citizens who were sold into slavery, but I am not able to testify under oath of first hand knowledge as in the case of John Bird. When the American Magazine commenced Barbarous Mexico, I was in correspondence with them from Mexico. After quite an exchange of letters, I offered, if they provided the expenses to go out and get unmistakable evidence that American citizens were then held in slavery. This was about the time of the "skillfully applied influences upon journalism," when they were doing the prostitute act, and they ceased there and then to reply to any letters.


