number of bills aiming at the abolition of the use of the injuction writ in labor disputes. One of these measures is known as the Moon bill, which was prepared by Taft, the "Father of Injunctions." This bill is, of course, a makeshift, and therefore stands the best chance of being enacted into law. The railway unions will no doubt make a strong effort this winter to

secure the enactment of a law pro-viding for the government inspection of locomotive boilers. The railroad men have had this bill before congress They have shown for many years. They have shown to committees of congress that such deaths and thousands of injuries each

There are many other labor bills before the various committees of both houses, but those referred to above are those upon which organized labor

will rally its forces.

The powers that be have decided to put the administration postoffice bill as the first measure for consideration. This bill was prepared naturally to help those who rule this country and oppress those who are employed by the department, and publications that have espoused the cause of the work g class. This measure is composed over two hundred pages, and contains many "jokers," which will be exposed in future issues of the APPEAL The committee on rules of which "Steel Trust" Dalzell is chairman, has before it pending a bill providing for an investigation of the hounding of Mexican political refuges in this coun-try. 
