The best that can be done under such rulership is to enforce certain principes of sociology and "help some." Nevertheless, it is absolutely essential, if we are to succeed when full Socialism comes, that the workers have training, and they can have training in no other way than to try training in no other way than to try on little things. These two elements seem to conflict; but they are merely the opposite poles of the magnet, the centripedal and centrifugal forces that balance each other, and if con-

sidered rightly they are one. We get our little ideas as to what Socialism will be and think those ideas are very essential. But they're not. It is essential for us as individuals that we think those thoughts out, because they help us and in doing that we are helping in the development of society; but Socialism represents the growth of the social organization to the point where it will free itself and do things for humanfree itself and do things for human-ity and the world. Our ideas may be swept clear away before we know it, yet Socialism may remain and the world may advance to higher points than we had dreamed.

The Socialist movement is very much in earnest; so much so that sometimes it is tragical. But after all, our quarrels don't amount to shucks. They represent, only the fighting of men for the ground they have held, and the mere fact that we are so earnest in holding on to what we have assures us that we shall not lose. But some are ahead of us and some are behind us, and instead of shouting to those who are ahead and quarreling with those who are behind we should realize that we are all moving together toward betmuch in earnest; so much so that are all moving together toward bet-ter things. There is no need of be-ing bitter, even toward the capital-ist, even toward the mere reformer. They, too, are honest, but they are going to move forward. You are going to move forward likewise. This is a greater thing than any of us have supposed and in all probability some-time in the future we will ourselves laugh at some of the things we do now and some of the things that seem now and some of the things that seem to be so important as to call for quar-rels. We must be very much in earnest, but we musn't lose our joys or our sense of humor. That is the sav-ing thing in life.

Distinctions and Differences.

What is the difference between sinte Socialist and the Socialism you advocate? Does presented sumership constitute state Socialism? If a musicipality owns a public utility, such as materworks or street residue, such as materialist-profit system constitutes state Socialism-profit system constitutes state Socialism it lacks democratic management in order to make it the proposition of the Socialist. Under such conditions supplies are necessarily longist at a profit and employment rests with the managers so that bousten, favoritism, and graft are possible. Socialists propose, not only collective ownership of all the means of production and distribution, but also democratic management of it. When all those things are collectively owned, then it will naturally follow that profit will cease; and with the ceasing of the profit system, there will be savings that are not possible sow. Democratic control, leaving the selection of managers and foremen to the workers actually doing the work, with power lodged in the same workers to unmediately recall their managers and foremen, will obviate graft and the concentration of power into few hands. The chief objection now urged against Socialism—that it would concentrate power and make the people merely bired hands of the political bosses—can There seems to be a great deal of agitation and difference of opinion. Even in the Socialist party there are clashes. But we must not take these things too seriously. It is the very thing that ought to happen, and in that sense you are right and I am right and everything is quite correct. They who keep their eye single to the Co-operative Commonwealth are absolutely right. They are not going to get the Co-operative Commonwealth in one sweep, but they are holding the movement to the one ideal that is worth anything. They who, on the other hand, are working for paliatives and are seeking to carry here a school district and there a

Dividing the Land.

Dividing the Land.

Suppose in a given country there are go,000 people and there is just enough land to give each one ten acres. Then suppose another hundred thousand moved to or were born in the island, what would become of them under Socialism? Land is something which cannot be materially increased. There are only two alternatives when the country becomes crowded, either there must develop a landed aristocracy and a system of landlordism, such as has prevailed in almost every country on the earth, in which the masses of the people, being without land, are made practically slaves or serfs; or there must come socialization of land. Under socialization of land that space now taken up with fences and many buildings will besaved and labor will be conserved to the highest extent. Land will then be cultivated scientifically and be made to produce anywhere from five to ten times as much as it does now. In this way the earth will be able to sustain well a population ten to fifteen times greater than it now has, and it can do it in no other way. This is why ultimately socialization of land will come. It will not be in our day perhaps, because it will not be in our day perhaps, because it will not be necessary further than to break the monopoly which now prevails and afferd access to land for all. But when the country becomes highly developed the people will go to it as the only solution of the groblem of giving nverybody a home. It will not come because of agitation but because it will be the most rational and satisfactory thing to do. We have been more wasteful of iand, there is tuilized in farming. 

Absurdity of Rent.

The absurdity of rent for the use if land, as well as interest for the use of money, should be apparent to all. Neither could be possible if it were not that both are monopolized. were not that both are monopolized. Man's right to life and the pursuit of happiness cannot be questioned, and there can be no greater infringement of that right when the source of all life, land, is hedged in with a paper title gained in the first instance by force. Man's right to the use of the earth can only be co-equal with another, subject to such regulation as a given, society may propose In another, subject to such regulation as a given, society may propose. In other words, an equal footing to the soil corresponds with the heart and brain of humanity. It is truly the highest aim of civilization to so reg-ulate the use of land that each may enjoy without restriction that which all perforce of birth have already acquired. This in no sense implies a division of products, only equality as to use. What will follow as to pro-duction and distribution of products with free access to desirable land will to a great extent become a matter of co-operation like land. Money moof co-operation like land. Money monopoly is its twin evil, subject to the same law of freedom. Money is but a counter in trade and production, a labor-saving device absolutely nacessary to effect exchange with the least possible friction or waste of energy, but under present restrictions equally a robber and a murderer together with land monopoly. Profit completes the trinity of evils upon which the
