

How would a shoe and harness repairer get his money or pay for his lafloor under Socialism? Besides, when people are able to afford good new things, there will be less wearing of patched clothes or shoes than there is now. 



President Taft has recommended to congress the l raising of the postal rate on papers from one to two cents per pound. Due to peculiar conditions this will hit the APPEAL harder than any other in the United States. If the measure passes it will increase the APPEAL's postage bill fully \$20,000 a year.
