

He can raise forty bushels of corn to the acre and can get fifty cents a bushel for it. He would have \$12 an acre for a corn crop after paying rent."
Accepting the Democrat's figures as correct for the sake of argument (but they are not), isn't that a magnificent sum for a year's work for an entire family—\$288 in the one case and \$96 in the other? For this the tenant is to pay, acording to the Democrat's figures.
