campaign they have made. There is every reason to be encouraged. In the face of discouraging circumstances a magnificent fight has been waged. We wish we were able to outline it in full and to give full credit to the many who, as state secretaries, speakers and writers, have done splendid service worthy of remembrance. We wish we could record the self-sacrficing deeds of the noble men and women who have made the great campaign possible. Their reward and satisfaction will come in the knowledge that this year we are actually going to enter upon the first fruits of our efforts and begin to reap the victory. Here are some of the good things the APPEAL confidently expects:

NEVADA-Socialists are seriously hoping to carry Nevada for Socialism, making it the first Socialist state in the union. Last year there were 20,800 votes all told in the state. With its 11 locals and 107 dues-paying members Socialists at that time polled 3,637 votes. Now there are 37 locals with 1,043 members. There are in the state 17,000 union men, most of them members of the fighting Western Federation of Labor. With four tickets in the field, and with Socialists represented for every office, there is a splendid prospect of winning the state. The national office is so hopeful it has put Vice Presidential Candidate Seidel, J. Stitt Wilson, Caroline A. Lowe, George H. Goebel and Walter J. Millard in the district for the closing weeks of the campaign. If Socialists do

KANSAS—Kansas is going to poll an extremely large vote, with a good prospect of electing Geo. D. Brewer to congress from the Third district. More than a thousand speeches have been made in this district this campaign, and a million pieces of literature, including 20,000 copies of the APPEAL every week, have been distributed. There has never been such a political organization of any party as that effected by D. C. Flint, campaign manager, and his earnest helpers. In addition to electing a congressman, a number of members of the legislature are certain to be elected, and numerous county candidates are conceded by the old parties. In an effort to beat Brewer the old parties are trading other candidates.

NEW YORK-New York will probably elect two con-The first will be Meyer London from the east side of New York City, where the Jews are numerous and nearly all Socialists. The second is George R. Lunn, at present mayor of Schenectady, who has made good, and whose arrest while speaking for free speech at Little Falls, N. Y., has advertised him and rallied the workers to his support. In addition to electing two congressmen, New York will elect a number of members of the general assembly, and county officers in great numbers.

WISCONSIN-Although the two old parties have practically united to defeat him, Berger will doubtless be re-elected to congress from the Milwaukee district. Wisconsin stands a splendid show of electing State Senator Gaylord a second congressman. The representation in the legislature will be

CALIFORNIA-J. Stitt Wilson will in all probability elected to congress from the Alameda district. He is now mayor of Berkeley. California Socialists will have a large representation in the legislature, besides electing practically all ne officers in a number of counties.

OKLAHOMA-Fred Holt is sure to be elected from the ourth district of Oklahoma as a representative in congress Several Oklahoma counties will be safely carried by the So-

ILLINOIS-Illinois Socialists are expecting to elect to songress Comrade Christensen from one of the Chicago districts. There will be legislators and county officers elected by the Socialists in Illinois.

OHIO-Joseph Bachman will probably be elected to e gress by the Socialists of the Columbus, Ohio, district. In addition, the legislature will contain enough Socialists to be able to do effective work under the new constitution which Socialists were so largely instrumental in drafting.

PENNSYLVANIA-Pennsylvania will elect at least ne congressman, from the Pittsburg district. This state, too, will find Socialist representation in the legislature sufficient to arrest the graft that has prevailed in other legisla-tures, and will also elect other officers to a large number.

MINNESOTA-In addition to electing an up state congressman, Socialists are sure this year to elect Thomas Van Lear mayor of Minneapolis, which they so narrowly missed at the last election.

THE SOUTH-Many surprises are coming from the southeast portion of the country. Socialism has been growing there during the past few weeks at a great rate, and the Appear, has printed a special edition for the states of Virginia, West Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Florida, Kentucky, Tennessee and Arkansas. The latter state, in its earlier elections in which it more than doubled its vote of two years ago, has already given an inkling of what is coming. Some of the other states, however, are going to bring even greater surprises. Florida will probably elect members of the legislature. West Virginia, which has been in a state of war nearly all campaign, and in which the workers under the ministration of Mother lones, have become very class conscious, is likely to spring great surprises; and Kentucky also will make a record that will be remembered for years. The entire south is going to poll a heavy Socialist vote. Mississippi sends word that it will have Socialist representation in congress after 1914.

THIS isn't all, but it is enough to inspire every Socialist in America to do his best during the few remaining days of the campaign. Stand shoulder to shoulder. Put forth greater. effort than ever before, and we will be able to make equally, encouraging reports from states and localities that are not mentioned above. Close up ranks, forward all along the line!
