Lansing, Mich. Jan. 9.—Women clamoring for the constitutional right to vote appeared before the state constitutional convention in large numbers. The Rev. Olivia J. Woodman of Paw Paw, Mrs. James Arthur of Detroit, and Catherine Waugh McCulloch of Chicago addressed the convention, uring that the right to vote be conferred upon women in the new organic law of the state.

Mrs. McCulloch, after devoting altention to the "unfortunate position of women" under the present law with reference to contracts, separate property, ownership of clothing, payment of services, inheritance, divorce, guardianship, and competency as witnesses, discussed their legal relation to jury trials.
