(Special to The Dally Worker.) JOLIET, III., March 30 .- Police of this town faithfully serve not only the interest of the steel trust of this country, but also the bloody government of reactionary Jugioslavia.

Workers of this town arranged a protest meeting against the white terror government of Jugoslavia, which is using every means to subject the working and peasant masses to the most horrible social conditions.

The South Slavic branch of the Workers Party of America, together with other organizations, called a meeting for last Sunday afternoon. But before the meeting was opened the chief of police, with six or seven of his lackeys came to the hall and dragged four workers to the police station and dispersed the rest of the

The arrested workers were held at the police station and all the books and various documents were taken from them. While they were held there for over an hour, the chief of police tried to convince them that the old despotic and czaristic government of Russia was better than the present workers' and peasants' government. Of course, he convinced nobody, ex-

cept himself. Among the arrested was C. Mikalachky, from Chicago, one of the editors of the Radnik. In his possession he had a few Inprekors, which the chief of police took from him and refused to give back. Ford and Rockefeller Both Spawned by the Same Capitalist System

By J. LOUIS ENGDAHL.

TODAY, there is much discussion of the profits exceeding \$100,000,000 taken by Henry Ford last year. It is said this huge profit indicates that Ford is the richest man in the world, having finally eclipsed John D. Rockefeller, and left America's other great multi-millionaires, George F. Baker, the Wall Street banker; and Andrew Mellon, secretary of the treasury, far in the rear.

Ford took a profit of \$47 on every car, truck and tractor that the workers in his factories produced in 1924. This is \$10 higher than the \$37 profit per unit that was reported for the ten months ended Dec. 31, 1923. This would indicate that the Ford hunger for profits is on the increase; developing in harmony, it seems, with the tremendous expansion program that during the last year added nearly another \$100,000,000 to the total assets of the Ford corporation.

But one of the alleged phenomena that has the financial writers worried, especially those who hover about Wall Street, is, as they claim, that the masses do not have the same hatred for the flivver king, Ford, that they have for Rockefeller, the czar of oil. It is argued that now that the profits of the Fords, father and son, far exceed those of the Rockefellers, father and son, that therefore the Fords should be hated more than the Rockefellers. They wonder why this is not so.

It is not difficult to explain this phenomenon. The Fords arrived late in the field of American exploitation. Ford found that he could get more out of his men working them eight hours than he could working them ten or more hours. In the pre-war days, before the tremendous increase in the cost of living, the wages Ford paid were considered comparatively good. This was all hailed as a "Ford Idea" that was thoroly exploited in books, newspapers and magazines, in one of the most widespread propaganda campaigns this country has ever seen. The "Ford Idea" was even accepted in foreign countries as one way of settling the labor problem. There have been no big strikes as yet in the Ford plants.

On the other hand cheap tractors and flivvers won Ford many supporters among the farmers until a demand of some consequence arose last year in support of the "Ford for President" boom.

Then there is the name of Rockefeller, like that of Carnegie, linked with some of the bloodiest battles against labor that this nation has seen. The words "Rockefeller" and "oppression" have come to be synonymous. Rockefeller entered the field of American exploitation a long time ago, and he built the Rockefeller fortune out of the blood and agony of America's working class. Large masses of workers know this. The name of Rockefeller is anathema to millions.

But that does not mean that Ford will not soon appear in the arena of the class war as an open enemy of the workers. The Ford boom among the poor farmers burst when the flivver manufacturer came out for Coolidge, the enemy of the farmers, for president. Cheap flivvers and cheap tractors have little appeal to poor farmers who cannot even afford to buy these. They are beginning to study what is the real trouble with the Ford-Coolidge social system.

It is not true that the Ford slaves are contented. One of the most militant sections of the American working class is made up of those tens of thousands of workers that pour daily in and out of the Ford plants at Detroit, Mich. Yet, so far, Ford has managed to hold them helpless in his grip. They are part of the huge Ford machine; exploited to the last drop of their energy; thrown on the scrap heap before their time just as much as the workers in the oil, coal, steel or any other great industry. They are helpless. They have no union. They have not yet turned to the leadership of the American Communist movement. But the hour of revolt will strike. Then the whole capitalist system, with all its brutal oppression, will stand behind Ford just as it has supported Rockefeller in all his struggles with labor. Then the Ford myth will vanish. The workers will realize that they must organize to expropriate the wealth of Ford, just as much as they must take the wealth stolen by the Rockefellers, the Mellons, the Bakers, the Garys, the Morgans and all the rest. These capitalists are all part of the same social system. The capitalist system alone permits the Fords to transmute the energy of great masses of workers into a golden stream of profits that counted \$100,0000,000 in the year 1924. The capitalist system must go. And with it Ford. Capitalist apologists may depend on it that the workers will show no discrimination between the different members of the plunderbund in the final struggle for power.

COMMUNISTS IN DEMONSTRATION AT WASHINGTON

Picket Polish Embassy for Lanzutsky

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28,-(By Mail.)-At 12:45 the ambassadors and their entourages of the various governments of the world were surprised with the appearance of a group of Communists carrying dozens of banners protesting before the headquarters of the Polish legation against the death sentence imposed upon Stanislav Lanzutsky.

The procession was headed by Comrades Jakira and Wicks, carrying a large banner with the inscription, "We protest against the plot of the bloody government of Poland to murder Stanislav Lanzutsky." They were followed by other comrades walking three abreast, carrying banners reading: "Hail the Communist Party of Poland"; "Stanislav Lanzutsky must not die"; "Down with the Polish bourgeoisie"; "Smash the Polish white terror"; "The Workers Party of Amerira protests against the murder of Lanzutsky"; "The Young Workers League Demands Freedom for Lanzutsky"; then other banners of a similar nature signed by the Workers Party and others signed by the International Workers' Aid. The procession concluded with a second large banner alike in size to that at the hoad of the line reading: "Down with the blood; Warsaw flunkeys of French imperial ism."

Amabassador Leaves by Back Door. The embassy closes at 1:15 on Saturdays and an auto drew up in front of the place, a luxurious mansion on 16th street, N. W., "Ambassador's. Row." A door opened slightly, but no one emerged. Then the machine drove around to the back entrance, and as the parade, consisting of about one hundred were just turning the corner when two men were seen to hastily run to the machine and speed away. Servants and office help peered hesitatingly from slightly drawn curtains.

Soon the street was full of automobiles and pedestrians watching the picketing demonstration. Reporters and cameramen began to arrive on the scene-but no policemen were in sight. After picketing the place until 3:30, it was decided to leave the place as

most of the embassies were closing. After the banners had been removed in machines waiting for that purpose the commissioner of police of the District of Columbia and a number of policemen arrived and asked to see those who had been in charge of the picketing. Comrade Jakira was referred to and the commissioner asked him, "What is the disturbance here?" Jakira replied: "There was no disturbance; only picketing the Polish embassy." Then the commissioner asserted that it was not the proper thing to embarrass foreign ambassadors to Washington and that they were supposed to be furnished protection from

annoyances of that sort. Press Carries Scare Heads. The evening papers of Washington were soon on the streets with screaming headlines, "Polish Legation Is Picketed by Communists" On the front pages were conspicuously displayed the pictures of the picket line with the banner reading: "Down with the bloody Warsaw flunkeys of

French imperialism!" According to inside information received after the demonstration the police were so harrassed by numerous telephone calls and personal visits that they decided to make a pretext of action and arrived at the scene of the demonstration just a few minutes after the pickets began to leave

The demonstration is to be followed by a mass meeting in Washington to protest against the proposed murder of Comrade Lanzutsky, with Comrade H. M. Wicks and A. Jakira to address the audience on this burning international question.

Organizing Officials.

The mine owners only believe in collective bargaining when they cannot destroy the union. Yet what did the officials of the union do? Instead of sending union organizers to try and get jobs in the mine and win the confidence of the men, and thru that most effective manner organize the men, they wrote a letter to the officers of the Wheeling Steel corporation which owned the Benwood mine and asked for a conference to discuss the matter of the Benwood mine again becoming a union mine. The company never replied to this letter. They could not have been expected to. The only time they listen to representatives of workers is when the workers who are represented are well enough organized to compell the bosses to come to terms.

The militants in the miners' union do not approve of the correspondence school method of organizing the coal mines. The miners' union was not built in that manner when the minorganized thru organizers who had the courage to face the sluggers and gunmen of the companies in order to

reach the men and organize them. One needs but to go back to the days when Mother Jones was active organizing for the piners' union. The history of the miners' union is filled with glorious struggles of the miners to organize themselves. While the workers in Fayette county. Pennsylvania, were living in tents as were the workers in W. Va. and other places, the officials of the union try to organize the correspondence.

To-day the bosses are planning wage cuts against the miners. In every important state where they have no state police they are campaining for them. They are preparing not only to starve the workers into submission, but to shoot them into accepting the 1917 scale.

The miners are demanding the organization of the unorganized coal fields. But the coal fields will only be organized by militant miners' organizers, who will not stay in the best hotels and fraternize with the bosses, but who will go among the miners themselves, win their confidence, by proving to the miners that growing strength of the left-wing and they too are willing to make sacrifices for the union.





Back to the Versailles Treaty

In his speech at Bar-le-Duc, former Premier Poincare informed that part of the world's popula tion that was listening Sunday that the powerful section of French imperialism which he represents will tolerate no rearrangement of the German frontiers.

The speech was an open declaration of the intention of the Poincare group to oppose any weakening of Poland as an ally against either Russia or Germany. It was undoubtedly intended as a notice to Great Britain that France has no intention of allowing Germany to enter a security agreement that does not recognize the colonial status of Germany.

Foreign dispatches state that Premier Herriot's new note to the German government will contain an almost verbatim copy of the statements made by Poincare Sunday, i. c., that the eastern frontiers must be guaranteed in the same way as the Rhineland before any further negotiations with Germany can progress. .

Months of diplomatic dickering between France and England have brought the two nations no nearer agreement. Both countries add to their armaments and encourage their allies to do like-

The Versailles treaty is still the basis of the frontier arrangements. It strangles the masses and keeps the fires of national hatreds burning. It can plant as a result of the inauguration of the spy result only in war.

> Hunting for That Job. To the DAILY WORKER:-I am an ex-soldier. I was fighting to protect J. P. Morgan's money, now I am fighting for a job ..

I have been in Chicago about nine months, out of the nine months I have been working only three months. Early in the morning I start on my daily routine, going to factories in hope of getting a job, but there is only one chance in a hundred to get a job, because there are several hundred people lined up. It shows there are many thousands of people here in Chicago that are in the same position as I am.

Finally I went to one of the employment sharks on Madison street. They had jobs for a few men as truckers in the Pennsylvania freight house. paid him four dollars for the job. When I went there, about sixty men were there, the foreman came out and asked who had tickets from the employment office. A few of the men that had a ticket got a job. I was one of the unfortunate ones that did not get a job.

When there are so many men out of work they could get plenty men without the employment sharks, but only of redder hue in the Ohio universities. those that have paid for a job have a little show to land one, while the others have no chance whatever.
