

That private ownership of the means of production and distribution of wealth has caused society to split into two distinct classes, with conflicting interests, the small possessing class of capitalists or exploiters of the labor force of others and the ever-increasing large dispossessed class of wage-workers, who are deprived of the socially-due share of their product.

Social Contrast on the Street.

THE LABORER CRUSHED BY THE MACHINERY OF ORGANIZED SO-CIETY - THE MODERN TITAN, BUILDER OF CIVILIZATION DE-BASED BY THE FABRIC HE HAS UPLIFTED.

Not long ago, in New York city, at thee rossing of a wide avenue, I saw a man pause. By his side walked a small, innocent-eyed child of some four years. The man belonged to a very low category of labor, the "burden-bearing class;" on one of his shoulders, worn and bent, rested a couple of heavy beams which he held in place with his two hands. The unwieldy load threw his body forward into a cramped and painful stoop. Thus encumbered, he stood hesitating on the curb, for the thoroughfare was somewhat difficult of passage for so young a child unaided. An elegantly dressed lady happened to pass. smiled kindly, took in her trim, sist the workers who were locked gloved hand the tiny fist of the inout, which is more than all America She received a grateful look from the father and disappeared down the avenue, her gentle face illuminated by the exquisite feeling which always accompanies an act of kindness.

The man and the child pursued their way. I watched the group. the little silent trudger and the bent form of the laborer. rays of the setting sun falling full upon him threw the shadow of the shape of an enormous cross The peculiarity struck me as 1 gazed, for, before my eyes, arose a vision of a solitary sufferer also bearing a cross up a hill, under the rays of a burning sun.

Far back in history we see the burden bearers, the suffering ones that they have not even one hand free to guide their children safely through the paths of life. And those others, the favored ones. they pass by their side, glance at them pityingly, as one of the cruel but necessary and inevitable re-Epernay and showed a strong ganized society; regretting perhaps inevitableness of their oppression.

How different are the facts! the back of this degraded class rests the whole burden of modern civilization, which, far from rewarding and glorifying it, is in deed the cross which crucifiies it. It has been computed by reliable authority that to each worker employed in producing necessaries are saddled twenty individuals who subsist on his labor. they too, may be working, producing luxuries or engaged in the administration of the great business concerns, but remove the one real worker and the twenty starve. Were the great mass of laborers to disappear magically from the face of the earth, then would it be seen how true is the fact that upon them, and them alone, rests "the burden of the world." brain-workers and administrators

art useless, the great educator and consoling inspiration of the human race? Alas, my brother, modern art exists but for the few, and until it carries its blessings even to the very humblest of men, instead of beautifying the oppressors' lives it is not true art. As has been said: "Art is the expression of the pleasure which men have in their work;" not to be monopolized by a minority but to be the common heritage of humanity. How terrible it is to be compelled to proclaim our thinkers, our singers, our poets of today mere parasites upon the real producers. Nevertheless, it is true, much as we as men and Socialists regret the bit-What is the remedy to these
