Shameful Attempt of Capitalists to Whip Workers into Submission.

The 1150 employees of the E. & H. Batcheider Shoe Company are still on strike, firm in their determination not to surrender to their masters.

The strike in North Brookfield is full of valuable lessons to the working class in particular and to every fair minded man in general.

When the firm announced a 10 per cent reduction in wages, with a promise of a sort of profit sharing scheme to be inaugurated-in the fu ture, the workingmen immediately mw that the employers wanted to diminish their wages to the lowest possible point of animal existence, let aigne human comfort. Lower wages were paid here than elsewhere and the greedy capitalists thought they could reduce the wages still lower But this time they erred.
