To the National Committee: Comrades—In accordance with the in-structions of the National Executive Committee and the provisions of the Constitution, I hereby call for the election of a National Executive Committee and

a National Secretary.

Each member of the National Committee is entitled to vote for not more than seven names for the Executive Committee, and not more than one name for National Secretary. Vote should be registered upon the enclosed form for balloting and reach the National office not later than Jan. 22, 1906. In filling out ballot, use ink.

Only those candidates receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected; a reballot will be taken on all candidates failing of election on the first ballot and receiving at least 10 per cent of the votes cast; providing the full quota of officials is not elected.

Annual Report of the National Secretary of the Socialist Party

From January 1, 1905, to December 31, 1905

Comrades—In presenting a review of the work of the National Headquarters for the year 1905, I call your attention to the fact that complete detailed and frequent reports of the office transactions have been rendered, and the purpose of this report is fulfilled in assembling the figures and associating the facts, convenient for reference and for permanent record.

There are at present 38 states and territorial organizations affiliated with the National Party and duly represented. Utah organized and received a char-

ter during the year, and the Indian Ter-ritory locals consolidated with the Oklahoma organization, September 23, making one organization of the Oklahoma and Indian territories.

As a result of National Party referen-dum "A" 1905, the state of Wisconsin was tendered and accepted a charter during September, and began to use the National Party dues stamps in Decem-

THE SOCIALIST PARTY OFFICIAL BULLETIN

The total receipts of the National office from all sources, including a cash balance of \$36.49, January 1, 1905, were \$17,527.37. The total expenditures were \$17,474.34, leaving a balance of \$53.03.

Itemized financial reports have been supplied each month to the National Executive Committee, National Committee. State Secretaries, locals in unorganized states, the Socialist press, and printed in the Official Monthly Bulletin. From these reports the yearly transactions have been compiled, and accompany this report under the caption of Table "A."

The principal expenses noted under the head of miscellaneous are as follows:

Attention is called to the comparative small amount received for the agitation fund during the year, which, including contributions and sale of Perpetual Campaign Coupons, amounted to \$891.13, against \$11,865.15, the campaign fund of the previous year. This is due to two causes: First, the fact that nearly every division of the party had exhausted or overreached their resources in the Presidential campaign, and, second, that there overreached their resources in the Presidential campaign, and, second, that there were so few important elections and these affected a limited territory. Table "B," "Lecturers and Organizers," shows the accounts of those working under the direction of the National Office, including amounts collected by each, amounts paid to them by the National Office, and all expenses, together with the number of states visited, days in the field, towns visited, meetings held miles traveled and locals organized.

It is here set forth that organizers under the direction of the National Office were a-field for 1,252 days. While the dates were distributed among a number of speakers, it was equivalent to having four speakers permanently employed throughout the year. A total of \$6,547.91 was expended for this purpose, of which amount \$2,114.90 was borne by the National Office direct, and \$4,433.01 by the places visited. In the average the daily expense for the maintenance of each speaker is found to be \$5.81. This includes \$3 for wages, hotel and railroad fare. Of this amount an average of \$3.55 has been gathered a-field, that is, con-tributed by the places visited, and \$2.26 has been paid by the National Office. In addition to those tabulated, Mother Jones, J. L. Fitts and Ida Crouch Hazlett, filled a number of dates for which no expense was incurred by the National Office.

Table C sets forth in detail a record of the sale of dues stamps, together with balances due the National Office by State organizations.

The receipts show \$14,264.58 was for national dues, of which amount \$13,728.68 came from state and territorial organizations and \$535.90 from locals and members at large in unorganized states and

The average membership for each month in the year is shown to be 22,881 in the organized states and 446 in the unorganized states and territories, or a total average membership paid to date of

and the average payment during the year 1903 showed a membership of 15,975.

It is necessary to state that the 23,327 members for which dues have reached the National Office monthly by no means rep-resents the full strength of the party membership. A glance at the monthly tabulation received from state secretaries that there are on the membership roll almost an equal number reported as owing one or more months' dues. By the present method of computing the membership, it is impossible to even rela-tively estimate the entire membership of the party, and such record will only be obtainable when the locals will assist the state secretaries in making their reports by regularly supplying detailed and specific information.

The value to the general movement of a monthly report from each local cannot be overestimated. To know by record the sure and certain rise of the organization, the preparations being made to take over the affairs of government and the capability of doing so, is of supreme importance. This knowledge will strengthen, encourage and build up the movement, and, indeed, it is the justification to our class for the existence of the to our class for the existence of the Socialist party.

The number of sets of account books that have been secured by locals argues well for the establishment of a uniform system of bookkeeping at no distant date. A uniform transfer card should also be provided by the National Office.

The activity of the Socialist party for the year 1905, in the absence of general political opportunities, was directed in part in reviewing the general character and criticising the effects and defects in-herent in the form of organization, but mainly and with signal success in perfecting the organization.

This is true in a greater degree than can be gathered by a cursory glance. It is in evidence that nearly every state organization has made great strides for-ward in their attention to details, facilities for covering their territory and the practicability of their methods, while the endency toward the complete control of the organization by the membership is more than gratifying.

tion, in practice, was honored more in the breach than by observance.

Representative state committees were exceptions, while now they are the rule. The operations of the referendum, national, state and local, has been extended to a degree out of all comparison with previous practices, until to-day there is scarcely a matter of any import any division of the party on which the entire membership does not have the opportunity of expressing their will and finally determine the course to be pursued.

constitution wisely provides against any editorial comment appearing in the Official Monthly Bulletin, and further Section 2, Article 5, "The National Committee shall neither publish nor designate any official organ." The primal danger of the party and the cause will appear when official thinkers are elected and installed. An official organ has ever proved to be a hand maiden to the reigning dynasty and tends to perpet-

uate their rule.

The combined circulation of the press which supports the party indicates that several papers come into the hands of nearly every member.

These papers almost without exception are losing ventures financially, and are supported either by voluntary contributions or direct donations by locals, thus being within the control of the membership, and their columns are open to the full and free discussion of all questions of principle, methods of organization, party tactics and criticism of the acts of

To this influence, more than any other I ascribe the present strength and permanency of the Socialist party.

At this stage of development the essen tials to which each comrade should con-tribute his share of effort, are: Increase the circulation of the Socialist Press, con-stant and systematic distribution of Socialist literature and the building of an organization, limited in numbers only by the number of the working class, limited in power only by the power of the prole-

the representation to which each organized state and territory is entitled on the National Committee is submitted in accordance with Section 1, Article 4, of the National Constitution, to-wit:

"Each organized state or territory shall be represented on the National Committee by one member and by an additional member for every one thousand members or major fraction thereof in good standing in the party. For the purpose of determining the representation to which each state or territory may be entitled, the National Secretary shall compute at the beginning of each year the average dues-paying membership of such state or territory for the preceding year."

Section 2, Article 4, of the National Constitution provides:

"The members of this committee shall the members of this committee shall be elected by referendum vote of and from the membership of the states or territories which they respectively represent. Secretaries of branches where central committees exist should make returns on or before March 2, 1906, to the secretary of the Central Committee, who will in turn report to the State Secretary.

Local secretaries in unorganized states or territories must file the vote of their locals, signed by chairman and secretary, with the National Secretary on or before March 9, 1906.

State secretaries shall compile and file with the National Secretary a complete tabulated statement of the vote by locals in their respective state or territory on or before March 9, 1906.

No person shall vote upon the forego No person shall vote upon the foregoing propositions who is not a member in good standing of the Socialist Party, in accordance with the laws of the respective state or territorial organizations where such exist; in unorganized states or territories, no person will be entitled to vote who is not a member in good standing on Jan. 23, 1906.

Local secretaries should keep and file for reference purposes an exact copy of the votes cast and reported. Each member is entitled to vote upon one of the referendum ballots provided for that purpose by the National Secretary. These ballots are furnished through the state secretaries in organized states and territories, and direct by the National Secre-tary to locals in unorganized states and territories.

FROM THE INTERNATIONAL SO-CIALIST BUREAU.

To all Secretaries and Delegates of the Amiliated Socialist Parties:

In this manner the 22nd day of January will be not only a day of enthusiasm, but a day of practical results.

We rely on your co-operation in this great movement, to the fullest possible extent. The Russian revolutionists need pecuniary support.
