"As I understand the spirit of the Hillquit motion, it was intended that the N. E. C. meet and consider the situation concerning the congressional campaign and take action accordingly. It was not intended that a campaign manager be appointed, unless it seemed necessary, and if the National Secretary has the work well in hand, then, of course, it would not be necessary. I may say here that I would be opposed to putting any one into the national office as campaign manager, unless extraordinary circumstances warranted, and I do not believe they do in this instance. At the same time, I should like, before voting on Comrade Work's motions, to have fuller information as to what is being done in the national office for the congressional campaign. It is difficult to estimate what has been done by the reports so far received. I do not believe the expense of a National Executive Committee meeting should be incurred at this time, unless the National Secretary considers one necessary, and in lieu of a meeting, I would suggest that he give as soon as convenient a statement of what he has undertaken for the campaign. As the N. E. C. has been constituted a special campaign committee, I submit that the committee should be as fully informed as possible on the campaign work. I realize that the National Secretary has been kept busy with the daywage fund and therefore do not intend any criticism in asking for more information before acting upon Comrade Work's motions."

month, beginning about Sept. 14th.

Comrade Lena Morrow Lewis of California will fill dates from Sept. 7th to 30th,
and Comrade John M. Work of Des Moines,
Ia., after the close of his Nebraska dates,
will reach Colorade about Sept. 20th to 25th

IDAHO. National Organizer Comrade Geo. H. Goebel of Newark, N. J., at the end of his Wisconsin engagement, Aug. 31st. will fill eighteen dates across Minnesota. North Dakota and Montana, arriving at Crossport or Bonners Ferry Sept. 19th, and will thoroughly canvass the northern end of Idaho for a period of forty-seven days, until the close of the campaign. Using Spokane as a connecting point, he will work in Kootenai, Latah, Nez Perce and Spokane counties; this includes the historical Coeur d'Alene and Wallace and Warden districts. There are about twenty-seven towns worth

enal. Latan, Nex Ferce and Spokane counties; this includes the historical Coeur d'Alene and Wallace and Warden districts. There are about twenty-seven towns worth reaching in this territory, and dates will be assigned according to their importance. In these four counties, nearly half the Socialist vote of the state was cast in 1904. Railroad travel in this section is most expensive, and to reach it from the south requires a detour through Montana or Washington. This assignment will save the State Organization considerable expense.

The importance of this northern tier cannot be over-estimated. Comrade James D. Graham, State Secretary of Montana, realized this and assigned Comrade Ira Crouch Hazlett, one of the State Organizers of Montana, to the Coeur d'Alene district, and she reports that it needs all the attention possible.

Comrade Graham has kindly consented to send others of the Montana state sneakers into northern Idaho and he will direct National Organizer I. Cowan's route with this end in view. I have also requested Comrade D. Burgess, State Secretary of Washington, to do the same with state speakers under his direction, and I am assured of his co-operation.

Arthur Morrow and Lena Morrow Lewis will enter this state about Oct. 5th, and remain till the end of the month, working in the southern end under the direction of the state committee. It is also the purpose to have some national organizer after spending the month of September in Nevada, where they are desirous of forming a state organization, spend the month of October in Idaho.

Every State in the union, organized or unorganized, has filed an application for one or more national speakers. To meet these demands, is both a physical and financial impossibility. Speakers should be sent wherever possible, but at best, only a small part of the territory can thus be covered, and some other method for general agitation must be devised and employed.

That which commends itself most strongly is to make a feature of the distribution of uniform literature direct to all congressional districts. Your decision to publish a leafet on the importance of the congressional campaign has been acted upon, and the same is in course of preparation by Comrade Franklin H. Wentworth.

The advisibility of printing this document in quantities with the name of the respective congressional nominees and the State ticket where there are state elections, should be given a consideration. To supply each congressional district with five or ten thousand, either free or at a nominal price, considering 300 districts, would require an addition of 1.500,000 or 3,000,000 copies, involving an estimated expense of \$2,250.00 or \$4,500,00. The distribution of these leaflets could be made in the latter part of October, when the campaign is at its height, and at the time when they would be the most effective. This would admit of careful preparation, besides giving the opportunity to gather or reserve the funds required. equired.

Committee place four speakers at disposal of the State Committee of Colorado for Sept. and October, I note the suggestion in the comment of Comrade Berlyn, that speakers of the type of Comrades Ben Hanford and Max Hayes be preferred.' Comrades Hanford and Hayes as types of speakers for that purpose, in my opinion, are not the sort that would accomplish the results desired. These comrades are committed to the 'pure and simple' conception of political and trades union policy, on unrevolutionary and non-Socialist ideaology.

"If men are sent by the National Ex. Com. to Colorado in this emergency they should be comrades who understand clearly the fundamentals of Socialist philosophy, and who are in sympathy with the Socialist movement as expressed in both the political party and in its supporting industrial organization. To send professionals, pure and simple' to educate the membership of the Western Federation of Miners were worse folly than the proverbial carrying of coals to New Castle, and would result in confusing the minds of others and blunt conception of the class struggle."

"I move:

"I. That a committee be elected, which shall be known as the 'Plate Matter Committee,' consisting of five members, not necessarily members of this committee, whose duty it shall be to organize and conduct a Socialist Plate Matter Service; having suitable Socialist matter set in type and printing plates made therefrom, to be distributed under its direction to Socialist Locals, Newspapers or others desiring same, at cost.

"2. That this Plate Matter Committee shall be subject to the authority and under the direction of the National Committee of the Socialist Party.

"3. That this committee shall be elected for a period of one year; provided, however, that the National Committee may remove any member or members at its pleasure, in accordance with the constitution and by-

any member or members at its pleasure, in accordance with the constitution and by-laws of the Socialist Party.

"4. That it shall be the duty of the chairman of this committee to make not later than the first day of each month, a report to the National Secretary showing all moneys expended and results accomplished during the preceding month, which report shall be transmitted, in substance, by the National Secretary to the National Committee.

"5. That this committee shall incur no obligation on the part of the Socialist Party for the setting of type, making of plates or for preparation on behalf of the Socialist Party, except of the character and within the sum provided in this resolution.

"6. That for the payment of postage and other expenses incident to carrying out the provisions of this resolution these most offiteen dollars (\$15.00) per month, or such portion thereof as may be necessary, be hereby appropriated from the National treasury of the Party.

"7. That all locals, officers and members of the Socialist Party are urged to co-operate with this Plate Matter Committee to the end of a wider dissemination of our propaganda and the more rapid growth of the Socialist Movement."

COMMENT.

From correspondence with weekly papers in my own and adjoining states, I feel confident there is a large number of papers in the United States, which will give us space in their columns for our matter, provided it is furnished by local comrades, relmbursing the publishers, the cost of the service being about \$1 per page of six columns, plus express charges ranging from 25 to 50 cents. This will give us one to two columns per week in each paper using it. These papers circuit among the farmers especially, who are so difficult and expensive for us to reach, owing to their being scattered and remote from the centers of population. We cannot win this fight without the farmers. I find, too, that the farmers are equally as willing to listen to our doctrines as the industrial workers, if not more so.

I think there should be as many as five members of this committee for this reason that the work can be divided into parts, and the burden fall lightly upon each. An executive man to push the scheme; a man to handle editorial (original or clipped) matter from, say the ethical standpoints, another to treat of the historical phase of Socialism; another to handle the industrial and economic features, and still another to interpret the events of the day in the light of economic determinism. The committee, however, can divide its work after it is elected and will find plenty for each member to de.

COMMENT OF JOHN M. WORK, NATIONAL COMMITTEEMAN OF 10WA, AUGUST 14.

"If this work is done at all, it should be done directly by the national office, an assistant in the office taking charge of it. It has already been tried and falled for lack of sufficient takers to make it feasible. Possibly it might fare beter now. Anyway, it done at all, there is no need of this complexity of machinery in order to do it. Let's keep our party machinery as simple as possible."

COMMENT.

(ALA.) LARUE:—"My reason for voting No' on Comrade Relliy's motion is that I believe to carry it out would involve too great a sacrifice. Other parts of the country, the south especially, are in dire need of organizers and agitators. There is no question that this course would help the vote in Colorado, but I believe it equally certain that it would result in greater harm to the rest of the country than it will do good in Colorado. The 'Lesson' we might give the capitalistic powers in that state would be no more effective than the lessons which have been administered from time to time by organized labor on the economic field—they are soon forgotten, not alone by the capitalists, but by the workers as well.

I admit that the bare possibility of elect, ing Comrade Haywood is a very tempting proposition. On the other hand, a large vote is likely to be cast for our ticket, which two years hence, cannot be maintained. In other words, it may, after all, prove to be an attractive bit of opportunism."

(II.L.) SIMONS:—"I am voting yes on motion No. 10, because it gives the National office discretion, but I am absolutely opposed to continual attempts by the National Committee to meddle with details of agitation, concerning which we cannot know as much as the National office.

There seems to be a general impression that organizers may be put into sny place where they seem to be needed any moment without taking them from somewhere else, that they are drawn out of the air for an emergency. I think if the members of the National Committee realize that all such motions as this simply tend to disorganize and disrupt the work of agitation, they would be more cautious about making them."

(I.A.) SMITH:—"On motion 10, I vote yes! Would like to see the Party put as many speakers into blood-drenched Colorado as possible. Let us put forth every effort that will result in increasing the vote of our most excellent comrade Haywood. If speakers of ability (ie., men competent to discuss Socialist philosophy, and at the same ti

rado."

(MINN.) HOLMAN:—"I vote 'No' on this motion for the reason that I believe that the motion offered by Comrade Berlyn to be submitted Aug. 7th, is the better one."

(NEW YORK.) LEE:—"Please recording for the concentration of the lecturers and organisers at your disposal in Colorado.

"I think that the national organization should give liberal assistance to the Colorado comrades at this time. But I do not wish to help tie the hands of the national organization by a definite and mandatory instruction, in view of the fact that the development of events may make it equally important that our forces be directed to other localities before the campaign is over. Such matters as this should be entrusted to the discretion of the National Secretary, it being understood that he should constantly consult with the National Executive Committee, which being a small body, can and should act much more quickly than the National Committee."

(IND. TER.) BENTLY:—"In voting 'Yes,' I wish to call attention to the great importance of the campaign in our own state in connection with our constitutional convention, and our first legislature shortly to be elected."

(TEX.) MILLS:—"Colorado is the real battle ground in this campaign. The result will be significant. Real Socialist strength is developed by education. The more educating done in Colorado, the more enduring must prove the results of the battle. We may not win the election, but it can be made an object lesson. I suggest that the comrades sent be grounded in their knowledge of the industrial as well as the political expression of the Socialist Movement."
(WIS.) HEATH:—"I cannot help class-

(WIS.) HEATH:—"I cannot help classing this with several other motions made of late, which seem to be inspired by impulse and inexperience in the Social Democratic world fight. I vote yes, because I am not opposed to reasonable assistance being extended to the Colorado comrades, so they may make a fairly decent showing in spite of the backwardness of the movement in that State. But it should be carrieds out in a cool-headed, practical way, for it is a crime to waste one cent of our ammunition, considering the magnitude of the general fight. In order to do big things in Colorado, we must have something tangible to build on. Yet the fact is that the total Socialist vote in that State for Governor fell from about 9,000 in 1902 to the pitiful total of 2,870 in 1904; this latter vote being given our good Comrade Floaten, in spite of the fact that he had suffered terribly along with the working-class of that state in the memorable Colorado labor war. If the working-class of that state is thus backward in class consciousness and solidarity at just the time when they had the least excuse for being so, I cannot see that a 'By-Jin-go' attack, such as our inexperienced and new comrade from New Jersey contemplates, could by any possibility bring commensurate returns."

The following letter has been transmitted by Comrade Huysmans, secretary of the International Socialist Bureau: "Paris, July 23, 1906.

Dear Comrade Huysmans:

This letter is a post-dictum, a practical conclusion to the proposition of intervention against war, of the interparliamentary Socialist Organization, voted by the conference at London. I ask you formally in the event of menace of German or Austrian interference in Russia, following upon the dissolution of the Duoma, appearing to become a reality and to put in danger with the Russian revolution the International Peace, to consider as actual the case foreseen by the double resolution of Brussels (March 1906), and of London (July 1906), and to summon immediately at Brussels the International Socialist Bureau and the Interparliamentary Socialist Conference, to take the necessary steps of labor and Socialist Intervention, national and international.
