To the Local Secretaries of The Socialist Party:

Dear Comrades:—According to the action taken by the National Executive Committee, the last Sunday in February is set aside for special demonstrations dealing with some phase of the class struggle of special interest to women. Woman's Day has become international and is observed by the Socialists in foreign countries as well as in the United States.

Sunday, February 25, is the third anniversary of this day. Are you preparing to observe it?

The special subject for discussion will be the White Slave Traffic. The past year has brought disclosures of the wide-spread nature of this traffic. It has startled the world with proof that our girls are sold upon the vice market of this country, just as the cattle are sold in the market. The report of the Chicago Vice Commission says: "What is the situation today in Chicago? The first truth that the Commission desires to impress on the citizens of Chicago is the fact that prostitution in this city is a COMMERCIALIZED BUSINESS of large proportions, with tremendous profits of more than \$15,000,000 per year, controlled largely by men, not by women."

Three hundred and sixty-five days in the year this traffic in vice is running at full blast, destroying hundreds of thousands and ruining the lives of millions. Should we not set aside ONE day to investigate why this condition exists and the means by which it can be abolished?

### Call for Nominations for Woman's National Committee and International Secretary, January 1, 1912

To the Locals and Branches of the Socialist Party:

You are hereby called upon to make nominations for Woman's National Committee and International Secretary. Your attention is called to the following extract from the minutes of the December, 1911, meeting of the National Executive Committee:

"The Acting National Secretary asked for an interpretation of Article XI, Section 1, of the National Constitution.

"Moved that it is the sense of the National Executive Committee that the term 'local' in Section 1, Article XI, of the National Constitution signifies units of organization, including branches, and that no delegate body shall have the power to initiate referendums or make nominations for national officers. Carried."

Under the above interpretation, each local or branch is entitled to nominate seven candidates for Woman's National Committee and one candidate for International Secretary. Delegate bodies, such as central committees, do not have the power to nominate. Three years' consecutive membership in the party is necessary to qualify a nominee as a candidate. Women only are eligible for the Woman's National Committee. Thirty days from the date of this call are allowed for nominations. In making nominations, use the form below and send direct to

COMMENT BY MORRISON OF ARIZONA: "The Socialist Party has seen fit, and very properly, to make it one of the conditions of membership that the applicant endorses political action, and it is the right and duty of those who choose our organizers and lecturers to see that those who go out as teachers indorsed by the National organization are not, while being supported by the Socialist Party, spreading the doctrines of anarchy and teaching the beauties of direct action. We have open enemies enough, and in our own ranks all the disturbers we need, paid by the capitalists. We have no need to employ them for this purpose and reward them with the dimes and quarters of the loyal members who still have some faith in the efficacy of the ballot."

COMMENT BY McCULLIS OF IOWA: "I can conceive of nothing more dangerous to the Socialist movement, nor anything better calculated to fill the capitalists with glee, than this impossibilist vaporizing."

COMMENT BY GERMER OF ILLINOIS: "Comment on this motion is unnecessary, except to say that recent developments call for such action."

COMMENT BY LEE OF NEW YORK: "Our National Constitution (Art. II, Sec. 6) provides that any member of the party who opposes political action shall be expelled. The Morrison motion seems superfluous. It ought to go without saying that no one shall be appointed as a spokesman of the party who directly opposes its avowed policies. I think we should avoid multiplying prohibitive rules; especially I dislike rules which seem to grant privileges to certain categories of party members or deny rights to others. Dear Comrades—The following is transmitted for your information:

A short time ago National Committeeman George E. Owen of Oklahoma sent me a motion to change the date of the National Convention from May 12 to May 5 because of the fact that the Southern Baptist convention will be in session in Oklahoma City on the 12th. On account of the fact that it is highly undesirable that the date of the convention should be in doubt, and the fact that I would have had to publish his motion without his comment, which would no doubt have prevented it from getting any seconds, and also on account of the ridiculousness of the situation, I suggested to Comrade Owen that he withdraw his motion, and he did so. I now have a lettergram from W. B. Moore, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of Oklahoma City, which is as follows:

"Socialist National Convention dates conflict with Southern Baptist convention in this city. Baptists here, which, with your delegates and members, will cause overflow of hotels and boarding houses, making it impossible to accommodate all. Baptists' date and arrangements for Auditorium fixed ten months ago, since which hotels reserved for their use. Constitution provision prevents their changing dates. Necessary for your organization to meet week earlier or later. Will you take matter up with proper officials and arrange for change. Wire our expense."

To the above I am sending the following reply:

"In order to reduce expense and to provide for a convention of a size adapted to transact business rather than to make a display, our constitution apportions the delegates so that they will only number about three hundred. Not a great many visitors are expected. The Auditorium would be too large for our regular convention, but might be used for a mass meeting. If the question were again put to our National Committee, various motions might cause the time of the convention to be in doubt for two or three months, which would be very undesirable. It has been suggested that the legislative hall would be a good place. Probably the religious convention will not bring as many people as rumored. The confusion is unfortunate, but, of two evils, I believe the lesser is to let the date stand."

### PROPOSED REFERENDUMS.

Beaver Falls, Pa., Dec. 27, 1911.

"Beaver Falls Branch of the Socialist Party proposes that the proposed amendment to the National Constitution by Local Bismarck (Tacoma, Wash.) be amended to read:

"Any member of the Socialist Party holding public office, either national or state, shall not be eligible to sit on any executive committee within the Socialist Party."

Membership in good standing, 155.

Local Hamilton County, Ohio.  
Amending Section 3, Article III, of the National Constitution, by adding the following:

"Any member holding any office in the national organization is ineligible to hold a second office in said organization, and if such a member holding one office is nominated his name shall NOT be submitted to referendum unless he (or she) first resigns the office held at the time of nomination. No member can be a candidate for two offices at one time."

"This ruling, if passed, to apply to holding two or more official positions all present officials and committeemen candidate for two offices at one time in the national organization."

Local Hamilton County, Ohio.

"That the National Secretary stand instructed to call for nominations for a committee of the "rank and file" of the Socialist Party, to be composed of seven members in good standing and NONE of whom have ever been connected with the national organization in any official capacity; and that this committee shall investigate thoroughly and completely certain recent actions of the Appeal to Reason, Fred Warren, Piet Vlag et al., in reference to the trouble involving Ernest Untermann, his daughter, Shoaf, and any others connected with this whole shady muddle."

"Nominations for this committee to be made by locals in good standing only, and each nominee's name to be accompanied by a statement of the local secretary as to nominee's individual standing, length of time in party and general activity and reliability as a Socialist, same to be used for the guidance of the membership when voting. National Treasury to pay expense."

Local Hamilton County, Ohio.

"That the National Executive Committee hereafter hold all sessions, whether regular or special, at the seat of National Headquarters, and not at different cities, as in the recent past; this action being taken for the reason that the National Headquarters is the real center of the national Socialist movement, whereas all information is readily accessible without extra carriage and inconvenience, where all the National Office employees are located or routed from,

and can be most easily and least expensively reached and used, and where the vast majority of traveling Socialists would naturally be."

"Membership in good standing, 450."

Local Berks County, Pa.

"Local Berks County, at a general meeting of the county membership, moves to amend Section 5, Article X, of the National Constitution, by substituting eight hundred in place of four hundred, as the basis of representation in the National Convention."

"Resolved, That the change become operative immediately upon adoption of the referendum, and that the representation of the states at Oklahoma City convention be decreased accordingly."

"Resolved, That wherever delegates have been elected in accord with previous arrangements, the first comrades on the list down to the full quota allowed be considered the representatives of their state."

"Comment: Railway fares of delegates to Oklahoma City will cost the party between \$12,000 and \$15,000. Any money saved could be used to better advantage in other lines of Socialist activity and propaganda. All acts of the convention are subject to referendum, and one hundred and fifty delegates can transact the business of the convention just as well as three hundred. Six or eight thousand dollars saved from railway fares would be of infinitely more advantage put into Socialist literature for the campaign, to be distributed free, or at absolute cost to organizations throughout the country."

"The membership of Local Berks in good standing is 1,000."

Local Washington County, Pa.

"Local Washington County, at a general meeting of the county membership, moves to amend Section 3, Article VII, of the National Constitution, by including the following:

"That each and every member shall be a subscriber to the National Bulletin, and be charged ten cents a year for same. And that the National Secretary shall apply for second-class mailing privileges for same."

"The securing of advertising shall be in charge of the National Executive Committee."

Under the above apportionment the following states are entitled to additional representation: Colorado, Connecticut, Idaho, Iowa, Montana, and North Dakota are entitled to two instead of one; Massachusetts, Minnesota, Washington and Wisconsin are entitled to three instead of two; California, Illinois and Ohio are entitled to four instead of three; New York is entitled to five instead of four, and Pennsylvania is entitled to six instead of four. Oklahoma is entitled to three instead of four. The National Committee is therefore composed of eighty-six members.

Section 2, Article IV, of the National Constitution, provides that the members of the National Committee shall be elected by referendum vote of and from the membership of the states or territories which they respectively represent and that the term of office shall not be more than two years.
