# VISITOR INVEIGHS AGAINST THE U. S.

Argentine Writer Makes Unsparing Indictment of American Imperialism.

Manuel Ugarte, novelist and post from the Argentine Republic, whose book "The Future of Latin America." has attracted attention, told an au-dience in Schermerhorn Hall, Columbia University yesterday, some very plain facts about the attitude of his country and his South American neighbors toward the United States. He denounced the Nicaraguan loan as the "most monstrous and the most shocking negotiation that has ever salotang negotiation the world." He said that the Panama Canal "rests upon a base of disloyalty."

He said that he came to challenge

the evil of imperialism toward which we are learning. A journey he has just made through all Latin America convinces him that "the blind restles ness and disquietude" that besets all his people is "organizing and crystal lizing into an alert and vigorous move ment of protest" against the imperial

ism of the United States.

Senor Ugario cried out against the reproaches that he says the United States are continually hurling at his peoples for their constant revolution "Such a reproach," he said, "is the most artful and monstrous that can be suggested. Audacity is indeed to utter it, when it is imperialism itself that has opened in New York and Orleans a species of stock ex-ge for dealing in revolutions where disorder and the hunger and ruin of many a Spanish-American country are speculated in."

## GREAT LANDSLIDE MAY DELAY CANAL OPENING

COLON. Panama, July 9.-Another great earth slide has started in Culebra Cut and canal officials here do not at tempt to conceal their intense anxiety as a result. Already several million cubic feet of earth have moved, and the shifting soil gives promise of worse to come. The grave danger lies in the possibility of the cut itself being flooded, a disaster which inevitably would delay the opening of the

Panama Canal.

It is estimated by the Canal Commission that it will take one steam shovel aion that it will take one steam shovel working steadily at least a year to clear away the present movement of earth. The alarming fact, however, is that the alide extends back into the hill to within a hundred feet of the east diversion, which is a channel designed to keep streams out of the cut. If the break should reach the diversion, the cut certainly will be flooded and all operations would be stronged temporarily. ions would be stopped temporarily.

Strenuous efforts are being made to strengthen the banks of the diversion in order to prevent disaster to the canal. To ease up the pressure a smaller diver sion is being dug about 150 yards east of the main diversion channel. This is ex-pected to take up part of the stream and decrease the danger of a break on the Culebra side of the larger channel.




