The International Socialist movement is triumphant just because founded on discovered facts and scientific deduction from those facts. To ignore those facts and laws is to drift instead of steering. Populism was a ship adrift and so went on the rocks. Socialism is a ship that sails with the pole star always in sight and with perfect charts. She will therefore arrive.

Some Socialists have only the most confused notion of what wages and the wage system mean. They talk, for connect notion of what wages and the wage system mean. They talk, for example, as if the farmer was on wages. They use "wages" almost as if it meant income or any return for labor done. Wages is the price of laboring power. It is what the worker sells his capacity for in the modern competitive market. It cannot exist apart from capital, which has been created by means of wage payment. The basis of wages is mjustice. Wages is robbery, in fact. It is by the purchase of labor power for a given time and a given sun, and then by the use of that power to produce more than he paid for it as wages, that the capitalist secures all his gains. This is the very essence of wage, and the wage system. To abolish this injustice, to make such robbery wholly impossible is the mission of the working wage system. To make such robbery wholly impossible is the mission of the working class. This is the primary lesson in the school of Socialism. If not then Karl Marx has lived in vain and there is no such thing as the scientific analysis of modern production.

The Seattle Union Record has some very sensible things to say about the divided condition of "organized labor." divided condition of "organized labor." It speaks of the sympathetic strike as the nearest approach to united action, and admits "that unanimity of action among unionists is impossible" at present. Reason: The conflicting interests of the different trades.

The dream and goal of the workers, annely, that when one is hurt all shall protect him, that is complete solidarity of interest and action. But such is prevented by conflicting trade interests.

Now it should occur to a thinking mind that there is one place and only

Now it should occur to a thinking mind that there is one place and only one place, where the interests of all workers are the same, namely, at the ballot box. All workers have a common interest in the abolition of the wage system, the Socialist program. There is no way to bring this about except by voting. Therefore, all workers will have to come to the Socialist position irrespective of unions or no unions. We have the platform on which every worker can stand, the only "organized labor" that can fully succeed, the true "sympathetic strike." ceed, the true "sympathetic strike.

A correspondent thinks he sees a servile adherence to Marx among Socialists, a sort of fetish worship. It seems un-American to him. We can do our own thinking here in these United States.

Does he reason that way about Darwin? The facts which Darwin observed, and recorded about pigeons or earth-worms, no one dreams of disputing. Just so, the facts which Marx discovered in modern production, the facts about men at work in producing things, the facts about wages and employers, cannot be questioned. SIDE-LIGHTS AND REFLEC-TIONS.

The mine owners are now putting in guards for their properties. When this matter has been fully attended to, and the companies have their Pinkerton hirelings and their merchandized deputy sheriffs thoroughly drilled, the business of running the mines with non-union men will merrily begin and then probably the workers will have some new things to remember besides Homestead, and the Coeur d'Alenes, and the innumerable other battles that Labor, with plenty of trades union and no political union, somehow failed to win.

"Patriotism" is one of those current words that need to be thoroughly deodorized before they can be used safely. Old Dr. Sam Johnson said that patriotism is the last refuge of the scoundrel. This is no longer true—we have advanced beyond it; now patriotism is the first refuge of the scoundrel.

The capitalist press asserts that "a sympathetic strike is the most inexcusable assault upon the public welfare." I wonder why. Perhaps the real reason why the hirelings of capital so bitterly denounce all sympathetic strikes, is that such strikes manifest the coming solidarity of the working class. The great spectre-that threatens capitalism is—"Workingmen of all countries, Unite!"

SOCIALIST MARTYRS

Every great cause has its martyrs. The men who make the first stand for progress, whose mission is to usher in the new order, are issually sarrficed. Half a century ago Carrison was mobed in the streets of Boston for publishing "The Liberator" and advocating the aboliton of chattel slavery. Now his statue adorns proud Commonwealth avenue, and the present generation proclaims him a hero, a martyr, to the cause of human liberty.

"Truth forever on the scaffold Wrong forever on the throne; But that scaffold sways the future And behind the dim unknown, Standeth God within the shadow, Keeping watch above his own."

Secialism, too, has its martyrs. In Germany, Liebknecht and Bebel spent years in prison and Marx was exiled most of his life. Thousands of workers in every civilized land shave lost their positions and income for daring to be free to think and vote. In the United States, "Sweet Land of Liberty," the number who suffer for the cause of the oppressed is increasing every day. From all parts of this state we hear of new cases. Last week we gave the details of the dismissal of Harry Kilduff by the Seattle Electric Co., for being "a dangerons man," as President Furth rold him. Kilduff is a Socialist and does not believe the interests of capital and labor are identical.

He was also the candidate of ar party for county superintendent of schools in the last election.

But Prof. Curtis has never allowed his political views to interfere with his duties as teacher of mathematics. No one has ever charged him with introducing Socialism into the class room. Indeed, most of his pupils were ignorant of his Socialist connections. He is a quiet man who minds his own busi-

Prof. Curtis has been teaching in Seattle schools for seven years. His ability is unquestioned. He graduated from the state normal school at Winona, Minn., in 1850 with the highest honors, and holds the best recommendations from distinguished educators, such as Prof. Irwin Shepard, secretary of the National Education Association, who have witnessed his work, His graduates have had no trouble in passing examinations for advanced work. Hundreds of his students will testify to the thoroughness of his scholarship and the excellence of class room training. No man could hold such a prominent place in the high school for so many years and not be doing good work. Four years ago he incurred the hostility of the superintendent of schools by testifying boldly in a public trial that the superintendent of the hostility of the superintendent of recommend his dismissal. As a brave, conscientious, competent teacher, the record of Prof. Curtis was of the highest character.

The Socialist party, in National convention assembled, reaffirms its adherence to the principles of International Socialism, and declares its aim to be the organization of the working class, and those in sympathy with it, into a political party, with the object of conquering the powers of government and using them for the purpose of transforming the present system of private ownership of the means of production and distribution into collective ownership of the entire people.

Formerly the tools of production were simple an moved by the individual worker—oday the machine, which is an improved and more developed tool of production, is owned by the capitalists and not by the workers. This ownership enables the capitalists to control the product and keep the workers dependent upon them.

Private ownership of the means of production and distribution is responsible for the ever increasing uncertainty of livelihood and poverty and missery of the working class, and it divides society in two hostile classes—the capitalists and wage-workers. The once powerful middle class is rapidly disappearing in the mill of competition. The struggle is now between the capitalist classes and the working class. The possession of the means of livelihood gives to the capitalists the control of the government, the press, the pulpit and schools, and enables them to reduce the working class.

to reduce the workingmen to a state of intellectual, physical and social infer-tority, political subservience and virtual

iority, political subservience and virtual slavery.

The economic interests of the capitalist class dominate our entire social system; the lives of the working class are recklessly sacrificed for profit, wars are fomented between nations, indiscriminate shaughter is encouraged and the destruction of whole races is sanctioned in order that the capitalists may extend their commercial dominion abroad and enhance their supremacy at home.

abroad and enhance their supremacy at home.

But the same economic causes which developed capitalism are leading to Socialism, which will abolish both the capitalist class and the class of wageworkers. And the active force in bringing about this new and higher order of society is the working class. All other classes, despite their apparent or actual conflicts, are alike interested in the upholding of the system of private ownership of the instruments of wealth production. The Democratic Republican, the bourgeois Public Ownership parties and all other parties which do not stand for the complete overthrow of the capitalist class.

The workers can most effectively act as a class in their struggle against the collective powers of capitalism, by constituting themselves, into a political party, distinct from and opposed to all parties formed, by the propertied classes.

While we declare that the develop-

While we declare that the development of economic conditions tends to the overthrow of the capitalist system, we recognize that the time and manner of the transition of Socialism also depend upon the stage of development reached by the proletariat. We, therefore, consider it of the utmost importance for the Socialist party to support all active efforts of the working class to better its condition and to elect Socialists to political offices, in order to active the stage of th

working people in case of accidents, lack of employment, sickness and want in old age; the funds for this purpose to be furnished by the government and to be administered under the control of the working class.

But in advocating these measures as But in advocating these measures as steps in the overthrow of capitalism and the establishment of the co-oper-ative commonwealth, we warn the working class against the so-called public ownership movement as an at-tempt of the capitalist class to secure governmental control of public utilities for the purpose of obtaining greater se-curity in the exploitation of other in-dustries and not for the amelioration of the conditions of the working class.

Infanticide at Ballard

Young Parents Dispose of Their Own Baby. Most Unnatural Deed. They Loved It, But Still They Killed It. Why They Did It. Disclosure of the True Reasons. What No Other Paper Dares to Print. Thousands of Such Cases in Seattle, But Kept From the Light of Day. Another Window Into Hell.

Western Washington is astounded by what appears to be a crime against nature on the part of two young péople living at Ballard, but recently from Aberdeen,

Aberdeen. Here is the story: A shingle mill worker, 24 years of age, met and loved a young girl of 16. He wanted to marry her, but her parents objected. He was not a good enough match for their daughter. They wanted a man of better standing, that is, with more property.

There followed the natural sequel. The young lovers married themselves without any ceremony. Three months afterwards the parents consented to a public wedding to cover the "shame." The young couple moved to Ballard, a shingle town adjoining Seattle, where in course of time the baby was horn.

The girl-wife loved her baby and the father. Here were all the elements of happiness, love and home, husband and child. But this poor girl was in torment for fear her old friends should learn of her "shame," a baby born too soon. She shunned company. She dreaded to see "callers." She went out when she heard any one was coming to see her.

And so all the evidence goes to show that this loving couple, loving their baby, too, yet wrought themselves into such a pitch of dread that they announced they were going back home, sold their furniture, said their good byes, went out on the trestle in the night, put their darling little one into a sack with a stone and threw it beneath the flowing tide.

The community is horrified and the parents are arrested on a charge of murder in the first degree. They will no doubt be punished according to law. The officers have already apprehended the wife, who can scarcely control her hysterics long enough to moand for her husband and her baby. He disappeared after he heard the baby's body had been found, but will soon be caught, if he does not kill himself—the most fitting denoument.

Now what does it all mean? Is this case so exceptional? On the contrary, hundreds of such unnatural murders are occurring every month all over the land. If this innocent pair, when they discovered their predicament, had called upon a doctor who would not scruple to assist them, the "shame" would have been effectually hidden. They waited six months too long. Prenature infanticide is so common as to occasion almost no comment. Women, both married and unmarried, resort to it as a necessity of existence.

Again we ask, why? The Socialist goes back to causes, and dares to



speak the truth. The law punishes the woman who is discovered in ne crime. That is all that capitalist society can offer as a remedy, punish the

offender.

But socialism says, remove the cause of the offense.

What is the cause of this offense? Why do young people refuse to have children? Why this awful prevalence of a crime almost unknown to our forefathers, which many regard as a symptom of race decadence?

One reason, only one reason,—his poverty, his inability to provide a well-furnished house, to buy rich dresses and set a good table and bring up their children in proper style. Therefore you have girls pregnant who dare not become mothers. Therefore you you have lovers who commit murder rather than face their "slame." Therefore you have married couples without children and the rich abortion Doctor. Therefore, your harvest of infanticides and your degenerate race.

How will Socialism solve this problem and bring back virgin life and happy homes into the world? By giving to all abundance of the good things of life. By putting everybody above want, with land and house and furniture and clothing and food and recreation.

Is this possible, you say? Fully possible, immediately. If workingmen will only vote to take possession of the land, mines, factories, railroads and other means of producing wealth, the thing is done. Wealth enough is created for all. Only those who create it don't get it. Let them take it for themselves, says the Socialist, and so let us have happy homes, full of happy children in place of hovels where children are unwelcome and all the healthjest human instincts are crushed out.
