



DEBS SAYS TO YOU "We have scarcely emerged from the caves of the jungles. We have lost some of the savage instincts of our antecedents, but we have not replaced them with humane and generous impulses. The individualism in which we were begotten and under which we grew to maturity has no ethical standard above its own belly-line. It has developed the beak and claw, the fang and hoof, and not the soul and conscience of men; and the extent of their ambition is to lord it over others with arrogant, heartless self-conceit, and glut their own low and vulgar appetites."

TAFT STANDS ALONE IN CONDEMNA: TION OF DEBS.

We take the following from the editoriol page of the Dallas (Texas) Democrat of a recent issue. Is it not especially significant that of two hundred men in public repute but one. Wm. Howard Taft, stands alone in condemnation of Debs and attempts to justify the life time sentence imposed upon him by the ruling class of the coutry thru its courts?

T. B. Williams, president of the North Texas Manufacturing Company, of McKinney, has been writing letters to prominent men throughout the country, requesting them to use their influence with President Wilson to have him pardon Eugene V. Debs out of the Federal Penitentiary at Atlanta, where he is serving a 10-year Federal court sentence, because of speeches made against war policies of the government while this country was at war with Gerof transportation from the United dence to the fact that the lives and many. > Mr. Williams wrote a letter to Ex-President Taft, urging him to intercede for Debs. Mr. Taft wrote Mr. Williams a reply. Mr. Williams has furnished The Dallas Democrat with a copy of the letter, with a request that I publish it. Here it is:

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 29, 1919 .- My Dear Sir: I have your letter in respect to Eugene V. Debs, I don't sympathize with you in your view of Mr. Debs. His is a most pernicious influence in the community. He did advise treason in seeking to paralyze the arm of the Government when it was needed to defend this country in her hour of peril; and not for the purpose of vengeance, but for the purpose of deterring other dangerous fools like him, a proper punishment had to be inflicted. I have no doubt that whenever the object of the punishment is obtained, the Executive will discharge his duty and exercise such clemency as may be proper.

In commenting on Mr. Taft's letter, Mr. Williams states that he has written to two hundred prominent Democrats and Republicans in behalf of Debs, and concludes as follows:

Taft stands alone in the replies I have received. I was never so agreeably surprised as when the letters began to . pour in, expressing such strong demand for the release of Debs coming from Democrats and Republicans.

Politically, I have no sympathy with Debs. Nothing in Socialism appeals to me affirmatively. Socialistic government in this country would be a calamity. THE COMMUNITY CHEST.

Camouflage is becoming a national trait, or is it that we merely recognize it when we see it and give it a name which the World War left us as an addition to our language? "Community Chest" sounds much nicer than "Charity Chest'. The idea of charity, you know, is becoming unpopular. It doesn't sound just right any more. While to be charitable used to be considered one of the virtues, one which our "most respectable" people could and did readily assume, it has of late fallen into bad repute. It is said that charity debases both the giver and the receiver. Besides it is now largely looked upon as means of camouflage for justice. Its upopularity, especially with the recipients is growing. They resent it. They prefer just plain every day justice and upon that basis deem themselves quite able to shift for themselves without the doles of debasing charity.

Just to what extent this idea is becoming fized in the mind of the workers, is seen in the action taken by the Cleveland Central Labor Council when the matter of contributing to Cleveland's Community Chest came before that body. The C. L. C. contributed \$10,00 to the Chest-and \$100.00 to the striking steel workers. Another union affiliated with the printing trades turned the Chest down flat and donated \$25.00 to the steel workers.

The city of Cleveland is raising a charity no, we mean community fund of \$3,425,000 which is expected to last a whole year and to administer to the needs of all the various institutions of the city which carry on their work thru money subscribed by free donations. Everybody is expected to give o quicken and to crystalize this revoltto this fund-exempting of course, the recipients.

The promoters have learned the value of mass action—and camoflage. Mass action in this case is arroused by a coalition of all public educational and informative forces of the city. Newspapers, churches, associations of all parties, quarreling among ourselves varieties, are engaged in one great enterprise, to put the proposition over by like petty politicians, and sheer force of cumulative publicity. The camouflage consists in arrowsing a "community" spirit by a substitution of "community" for "charity" and by the implied responsibility of all elements of the city in the welfare of the city's period of the dissolution and collapse
