

A WORD WITH THE VOTER BEFORE ELECTION.

We are on the eye of a numerical election. Those who are interested

(1) Not because you cannot think for yourself, but because your position In your community as a wage earner-street sweeper or skilled laborer, bookkeeper, store or drug clerk, or teacher-you had to give all your energies, all your thoughts to your work. Care for self, wife and children; fear of losing your job has taken away from you the time and killed in you the inclination to find out whether all you have been taught is true and calculated

(2) You have been kept ignorant of your interests as a wage earner. You have been taught to believe the interests of the wage-earning class to be identical with the interests of the capitalist class.

(3) You have been taught to believe that it is the man you have to vote for, and not the principles for which that man stands.

Now, Mr. Voter, we are sure had you less care and worry, were you not in constant dread of losing your job, had you more time to think and study. you would see that municipal, state and national affairs are of equal importance to you as a wage earner.

If it were true that municipal, state and national affairs have nothing in common, it must, then, also be true that your needs as a citizen in your municipality, state and nation have nothing in common. Is that true? Is it not a fact that you are a man, a husband and a father in one as the other; and as such you are in the one as the other in need of everything which enables you to live a normal life, a life fit for a human being!

We thoroughly agree with our "strenuous" President, who sheds so many "strenuous tears" over "race sulcide;" but unlike our good President, we claim our men must earn enough, to have a moral right to take "unfo him" a wife and beget children. We claim it is a crime to take a wife to have her earn a living for us; to beget children who should from early childhood sacrifice their young lives to the god profit. We claim it a crime to deprive our children of their childhood and education.

Criminal abortions are committed not because of love, not because of moral dilapidation, but because our young men cannot support self, wife and children; they remain single. Our sisters and daughters do not earn enough, and are often compelled to sell their bodies. Our married folk fear an additional mouth and stomach which is to be fed, and a back which is to be clad. These circumstances compel them all to commit the crime of "race suicide."

"Life is sacred," we are told. But the wage earner sees the capitalist class and its municipal, state and national governments kill the wage earnernot for crimes, but because the wage carner asks for means to support self and family; asks for means not to be compelled to remain single; asks for neans not to be compelled to commit "race suicide."

Race suicide is an abhorrent crime. To stop it, let municipal, state and national affairs be conducted in a way that every man finds employment; that every man who works receive all he produces.

We claim it is not true that the interests of the wage earner are identical with those of the capitalist. If this were true, wage earners would never have to strike for higher wages, or against a reduction of wages; for shorter hours of labor or the recognition of unions; wage earners would never have to demand the abolition of prison or child labor. If this were true our government-municipal, state or national-would never send the police, state and national troops to break the strikers' backbone, shooting them as mad dogs, clubbing them to insensibility or death; throw them into buil pens, deny them a trial by jury; yes, denying them the right of habeas corpus, as is the case now in Colorado. If the interests of the capitalist class and those of the working class were identical, our high courts would never declare laws for the benefit of the working class to be unconstitutional and declare all the laws for the benefit of the capitalist class constitutional.

It is to the interest of the capitalist class that there be a reserve army of unemployed. The more unemployed the flercer the competition for jobs, the smaller the wages; the more men ready to sell themselves as police and soldiery. This is of benefit to the capitalist class, but we defy anyone to

prove this to be of equal benefit to the working class. As long as our people are divided into classes, that long will such conditions prevail; that long will you-wage earner-have to suffer. We are divided into classes, not because we want it, but because things which belong to and should be held in common by all the people are to-day owned and controlled by the capitalist class. Land and mines, railroads, telegraphs, machinery and factories and mills, etc., must and should be the property of all the people. As long as one individual owns any of them, that long

The Republican as the Democratic party stands for the interests of the capitalist class, namely, that the capitalist class continue to own all these means of production; that you, wage earner, continue to depend on the good vill of the capitalist to give or not give you employment. The men who stand-upon either the Republican or Democratic party platform stand for the interests of the capitalist class, and when elected will use the police force with its clubs, the army with its gatling guns, the court with its injunctions, the buil pen with all its horrors, to club and beat you into submission, whenever you dare to show signs of dissatisfaction with your employer. Mayor Harrison has spoken sweet words of hope, sweet hope, to you before election. He spoke to gain your vote. Elected, he gave protection to the employers and not the working people-the strikers.

The principles upon which the platform of Mr. Harrison's party is based are principles based upon the right of the capitalist to starve you, to deprive you of the means to support self and family; to deny your child its childhood; o cripple your child physically, intellectually and morally; to make a beast of burden of you, your wife and little ones.

In voting for a Harrison or any one of his class, you vote for a good: nan who stands for principles which imply your abject slavery.

Whether there be a municipal, state or national election your needs are always the same. To satisfy your needs, you must always make the same demands. A platform of a political party is the expression of the demands made by that class whose interests that party represent. The Republican and Democratic parties stand for the interests of the capitalist class. You are a workingman. You must belong to a party that stands for the interests of the working class. You must vote for the one who stands upon a platform which is the expression of principles based upon the interests of the working class. These principles are: Society must cease to be divided into classes whose interests are diametrically opposed to each other's. All the people to own all the means needed by each to comfortably support self and family. All who wish to enjoy life must work. All who do not work shall have no means to enjoy life. Children, aged, physically and mentally feeble

to be excepted from the need to work. Upon these principles the platform of the Socialist party is based. Every Socialist nominee, if elected, will fight for these principles

STRIKERS AND PICKETS CONSIDERED VAGRANTS

The police have been instructed to enforce the new vagrancy law against striking pickets, five men being now under arrest charged with disorderly conduct in loltering around the Federal Manufacturing Company's plant in West Monroe street, where the brass workers are on strike.

Lieut. O'Connor, of the Desplaines Street Police Station, has informed the union men that if they are found within two blocks of the plant and are unable to give an account of themselves they will render themselves hable to arrest. The union intends to protest to Chief O'Nefil against the order.

If the union ment of Chicago have grain of common sense, if they have any knowledge of the relation between cause and effect, instead of entering their protest to Chief O'Neill, where they know from past experience, it will fall on deaf ears, if they are able to learn anything from experience, they will enter their protest, 100,000 strong, on April 5th at the ballet box by voting for the Sesalist candidates for

Aldermen. That is the only time and place to register an effective kick-a protest which will not be ignored.

A SAMPLE OF WHAT WORKING MEN IN CHICAGO MAY EX-PECT.

An article in another column on the situation in Colorado would indicate that there is absolutely no limit to the length which the present rulers will go in their fight to compel the submission of the working class. It will be remembered that on an alle gation, which was later proved to be false, that a union man had set off a charge of dynamite in a mine, the entire State militia of Colorado was alled out, the city of Telluride placed under military rule and nameless outrages perpetrated, lasting through sevminers were disarmed by the military authorities, while arms were served out to all the thigs whom the Alliance work. 
